Introduction



British Sign Language (BSL) is a recognised language in Scotland.

It is the first or preferred language of many Deaf or Deafblind people.



The British Sign Language (Scotland) Act 2015 says we must publish plans every 6 years, showing how we will tell more people about BSL in Scotland and encourage them to use it.



Historic Environment Scotland (HES) is the main organisation that looks after Scotland's **historic environment** and tells people about it.

The **historic environment** is:

- places and things that show us what happened in the past, like a castle or garden, or things like books or maps
- Sooks
- cultural heritage like stories, crafts, and traditions – thinking or behaviour that has happened for a long time



We are committed to making our information and services accessible and inclusive.

Inclusion means everyone can take part and have the same chance.



We want to involve and **engage** all BSL users so that we can work well together to promote Deaf history and culture in Scotland and beyond.

Engagement means communicating with people to find out what they think and what their experiences are.

Our <u>Heritage for All</u> plan sets out our **vision** that Scotland's historic environment is looked after, understood, shared and enjoyed by everyone.

Our **vision** is what we want to happen.


It sets out our work from 2024 to 2030 and links with our 2021-25 Equality Outcomes.

BSL accessibility




A goal is what we want to happen.

Our departments will put resources aside each year to make sure the work in this plan is done by 2030




- check how many people use our BSL services

 - the different education, work, and life experiences of BSL users




Improve the accessibility of our:

Access to employment – ways into work



We support the BSL National Plan goal that:

BSL users will get support to:

- develop their skills
- find the right route to employment
- get a job
- be the best they can be
- progress in their job



We will.

Make sure that ways into working and volunteering with Historic Environment Scotland include the needs of BSL users:

- continue to work with Inclusion Scotland, Deaf Action, and others to offer training opportunities for BSL users

 make sure the way we advertise jobs and choose people to do them is accessible for BSL users



 use apprenticeships and work experience as a way into work for young BSL users

An **apprenticeship** is a real job where you learn, gain experience and get paid.



- make sure that our managers know about Access to Work funding to support BSL users at work
- give support and advice to managers supporting Deaf colleagues in the workplace



- offer BSL training and Deaf cultural awareness for our workforce, including our volunteers
- start ways for BSL users to volunteer



- have ways at HES sites for deaf children at schools and colleges to:
 - o understand more about heritage
 - have work experience opportunities with BSL interpreters for communication support



 have opportunities for Deaf BSL users to be trained and to give guided tours at our sites

Health and Wellbeing



We support the BSL National Plan goal:

BSL users can get the information and services they need to live active, healthy lives, and to make choices at every stage of their lives.



We will:

Be part of wider work to deal with social isolation in the Deaf community

Social isolation means not having much contact with other people.

 understand more about how the historic environment can help people's health and wellbeing - feeling comfortable, healthy and happy



 understand the importance of Deaf identity on a person's wellbeing

An identity is how you see yourself.



 recognise and celebrate intersectional Deaf identity for diverse groups

Intersectionality means looking at how things affect people and their different identities.



- tell BSL users, Deaf communities, and organisations about how the historic environment can offer spaces for:
 - o education and learning
 - spending time doing things you enjoy
 - having time to think about things
 - encouraging you to do something or to try something new
 - o and entertainment



Celebrating BSL culture



We support the BSL National Plan goal that BSL users:

- will have full access to the cultural life of Scotland
- will have equal chances to enjoy and contribute to culture and the arts
- are encouraged to share BSL and deaf culture with the people of Scotland



We will:

Work with others in culture, heritage, and arts to recognise Deaf heritage and culture in our information.



Provide opportunities for BSL users to take part in and enjoy the cultural life of Scotland.

our work on Deaf heritage projects will involve the Deaf community



 tell people about our use of BSL Tours, new technology and other creative ways of working



 tell the Deaf community more about climate change issues in the historic environment

Climate change is the way the world's weather and temperature are changing because of things like pollution from cars and factories.



 use our research programmes to explore and share stories that people do not know much about including Deaf heritage



 give a greater range of experiences for BSL users visiting our properties by having more tour guides and ways to get online information




- look at different ways to get heritage information through our online site Trove
